Dramatic Readings

They read from the book, from the Law of God, clearly, and they gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading. Nehemiah 8:8

Help your students capture the excitement of the Bible stories and express it as they read them aloud. Dramatic readings provide a way for the children to enter into the stories and develop good reading skills as they make a determined effort to bring the words to life.

Start by reading through the story and working out any vocabulary and pronunciation problems. Then talk about the characters and how they feel as the story develops. Encourage the children to put this feeling into their reading without overdoing it. Have them imagine that they are the actual characters as they read their parts. Then do the reading together and make it live!

A modern version is used in the script. Props and actions can be optional.


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Zacchaeus Luke 19:1-10 (ESV)

Four chairs plus a high stool (for Zacchaeus to sit on), large Bible name tags for all readers.

The reading

Narrator: Jesus entered Jericho and was passing through. And there was a man named Zacchaeus. He was a chief tax collector and was rich. And he was seeking to see who Jesus was, but on account of the crowd he could not, because he was small of stature. So he ran on ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him, for he was about to pass that way.

(Luke 19:1-4)

(Action: Zacchaeus runs in and climbs on the stool.)
